\$100,000 Match for December Gifts to the Annual Fund

A group of loyal donors to Madison Public Library Foundation is offering a \$100,000 match throughout December for all gifts made to the annual fund, which fuels core library resources and programming. Every contribution will go twice as far!

In 2023, annual fund gifts supported:

- collection items books, large-print books, Spanish-language picture books, music, movies, and even seed libraries
- **programs,** including *Library Takeover* and *Live Well* @ *Your Library*
- technology computers, Wi-Fi, and audiovisual upgrades in meeting rooms at many libraries
- AASPIRE internships (Affirmative Action Student Professionals in Residence) for students of color and others from underrepresented groups as part of the foundation's Equity and Innovation funding initiative
- library staff training and professional development
- **sewing machines** for Sequoya Library classes
- the library staff's BIPOC and Pride Affinity Groups
- lecterns for Central Library events, such as Wisconsin Book Festival free author programming

You can expect the foundation to fund many more critical library services and materials in 2024, in addition to reserving 10 percent of annual fund proceeds for the permanent endowment, which sustains the library for the future.

Mailed gifts must be postmarked by December 31 to count toward the 2023 tax year and to qualify for the match.

Smart Tips for End-of-Year Giving

Do you own appreciated stock? Are you a retiree age 70 ½ or older with an IRA subject to required minimum distributions (RMD)? If either applies to you, you could reduce taxes by making your year-end contribution to our foundation through a stock gift or giving from your RMD.

Donating stock is a win-win strategy because it can help you avoid large capital gains taxes, and the recipient nonprofit does not pay taxes on the gift. By making a charitable gift from your IRA RMD, you can reduce your adjusted gross income, and you may receive the full tax benefit if you're not taking the standard deduction.



Wisconsin Book Festival Wraps 2023, Announces Spring Events

Under the leadership of new Director Jane Rotonda, the Wisconsin Book Festival presented 91 free author programs in 2023, concluding a fantastic year with beloved children's author Jan Brett speaking about her latest book, *Cozy*, on December 2.

Last spring, the festival brought musician and *Crying in H Mart* author Michelle Zauner, and actor Elliot Page for his memoir *Pageboy* to the Barrymore Theatre for standing-room-only events. During the four-day Fall Celebration weekend, the festival hosted 54 authors, from local favorites to *New York Times* best-sellers: Craig Thompson, Dan Egan, Vauhini Vara, Nabil Ayers, Beth Nguyen, Jamel Brinkley, Schuyler Bailar, José Olivarez, Cat Bohannon, and John Scalzi, among others. *New Yorker* cartoonist Roz Chast had the honor of delivering the Cheryl Rosen Weston Memorial Lecture in November.

Making Justice Participants Learn to Create Podcasts

Madison Public Library's *Making Justice* program, run by the Bubbler staff, is teaching incarcerated and at-risk youth to create podcasts, videos, visual art, and more.

A November 25 Wisconsin State Journal story highlighted the program's work that engages local artists, culture makers, and Bubbler staff to share their crafts with participants. Local podcasting personality Dee Star, who presents the podcast *OuttaDeeBox* about mass incarceration, talked with the reporter about his podcasting class, which instructs on how to interview and record interesting guests

discussing various subjects to create episodes.

"I cannot even tell you how many times I've asked the question, 'What do you want to be?' "Star told the *State Journal*. "So many kids say, 'I don't know if I'm going to be alive.' The 'I don't know' is totally fine when you're 15, 16. But to say you're probably not going to be alive? It's heartbreaking."

Save the Date: Lunch for Libraries with Tommy Orange

Best-selling novelist Tommy Orange will be the featured speaker at Madison Public Library Foundation's 2024 Lunch for Libraries fundraiser on Tuesday, April 23, at Monona Terrace Convention Center.

Orange is well known for his acclaimed debut novel There There, which speaks to the complexities of the urban Native American experience, exploring narratives of violence and recovery, hope and loss, and identity and power. In 2019, There There earned Orange the PEN/Hemingway Award, an American Book Award, and the John Leonard Prize. He was also a 2019 Pulitzer Prize finalist.

Orange will discuss his highly anticipated follow-up, Wandering Stars, in which he traces the legacies of the Sand Creek Massacre of 1864 and the Carlisle Indian Industrial School through three generations of a family in a tale that is by turns shattering and wondrous.

Orange is a 2014 MacDowell Fellow, a 2016 Writing by Writers Fellow, and a graduate of the MFA program at the Institute of




American Indian Arts. He is an enrolled member of the Cheyenne and Arapaho tribes of Oklahoma, and was born and raised in Oakland, Calif. He lives in Angels Camp, Calif., with his wife and son.

Bubbler's Our Town Everywhere Portrait Collection Growing

Our Town Everywhere is a unique portrait-making project led by Madison Public Library's Bubbler program. Throughout the past year, the project has sparked connections, conversation, and collaborative creation in libraries, parks, and other community spaces.

"We're excited to have the opportunity to reflect this project back into the communities that have participated," said Bubbler Program Administrator Carlee Latimer. "We're hoping many see familiar faces within these exhibitions, and are reminded of our collective humanity and creativity."

The project, which involves creating

stamped self-portraits, is made possible by a grant from the Madison Arts Commission, secured by Madison Public Library Foundation. The grant allows Bubbler staff to fund and mobilize the program, bringing Our Town Everywhere to life throughout Madison.

Letterpress printmaker Bryce McCloud traveled around Davidson County inviting people to create stamped self-portraits. The completed project included more than 1,000 portraits and was added to the Nashville Public Library's permanent archives.

In Madison, Our Town Everywhere hopes to build a full, representative collection of portraits by the end of 2024. The project currently sits at 810 portraits and 49 community partners.

Community Weighs in on Imagination Center

a wonderful portrait

Madison residents had the opportunity to view current designs of the northeast side Imagination Center at Reindahl Park and provide feedback on the project during a virtual public input session on November 6.

The meeting was hosted by three of the four project partners — City of Madison Engineering, Madison Public Library, and Madison Parks - as well as JLA

Architects, which is leading design of the facility and its surroundings. Madison Public Library Foundation is also a project partner and plans to fundraise \$4.5 million of the \$18.6 million project total; other funds will come from the city budget.

The new community facility, which will be constructed at 1818 Portage Road in Reindahl Park, will include the library's 10th new location and an indoor, rentable

park pavilion. The 17,500-square-foot facility, with about 12,000 feet dedicated to library use, will serve as a vibrant, multifunctional indoor-outdoor library and community space, bringing much-needed library and city services to an estimated 26,000 residents on the growing northeast side. With a serene setting, a combined city services menu, and an interweaving of nature, play, and learning, the center will lift up the whole city while closing service gaps and improving equity.

Construction is slated to begin in fall 2024, with project completion by early 2026.

Foundation Raises \$30,165 for Digital Collection

Giving Tuesday, a day to celebrate generosity and charity, was November 28. This year, a family with a passion for audiobooks provided the foundation with a \$15,000 matching gift to encourage donations to the library's digital collection. The library's digital collection includes:

- eBooks and audiobooks that are part of Wisconsin's Digital Library (Madison Public Library is a top contributor of titles)
- online newspaper and magazine subscriptions
- · Kanopy video streaming service

The digital collection is critical for providing equitable access to library materials, especially for people who face barriers to visiting the library in person. But digital library materials are more costly than print materials, making wait times much longer for library users.

Thanks to the match gift and to the other generous Giving Tuesday donors, the library will be able to bolster and renew its digital resources, helping it facilitate literacy and lifelong learning.

When Conor Moran took over as Executive Director last December, one of the first changes he made was to his email signoff. Little did he know that by adding the simple closing statement,



It's building stuff! Let's build a rocket!'"

Child-led play has incredible benefits to children's learning. Foundation dollars allowed the library to purchase new, open-ended play materials for all nine libraries over the last two years. They can be used in many ways — for stacking, stepping on, and crawling over — depending on a child's interests and imagination.
