Let's Celebrate! Madison Public Library Marks 150 Years

On May 31, 2025, Madison Public Library will mark 150 years of service to the community! Beginning in late January, the library — with support from Madison Public Library Foundation - will kick off a yearlong Celebrating the Past, Inspiring the Future effort. Plans are in the works, and they include:

- special events in May
- an interactive digital timeline showcasing the library's history
- · giveaways of library merchandise
- an outreach campaign, including library card signups, at events throughout the community in September
- · history fun facts in the library's email newsletters and on social media
- opportunities to share what you love about the library with a Bubbler Artist-in-Residence, who will create a collaborative art piece made out of community testimonials

"Madison Public Library has been a part of this community since 1875," Library Director Tana Elias said. "The library has been here through some of the most pivotal moments in Madison's history, and we're excited to share many stories throughout 2025 that illustrate how integral the library has always been to the Madison community. We look forward to celebrating this milestone with you and envisioning together what the next 150 years of library service could look like."

Lost in the Stats: What's Trending at the Library

New to our newsletter this year is Lost in the Stats, a recurring feature that will highlight interesting library-related numbers. In this issue are encouraging findings from the Urban Libraries Council's 2024 Library Insights Survey,

> which provides a snapshot of post-pandemic performance for urban libraries across the U.S. and Canada, including Madison Public Library, from 2022 to 2023. Source: urbanlibraries.org

Number of libraries surveyed: 115

Number of locations: 2,260

Population served by surveyed libraries: 87.5 million

- **52%** increase in total room reservations
- **24%** increase in library visits

- 11% percent increase in the number of eResources accessed (with a remarkable 40% increase when compared to 2019)
- **42%** rise in the number of library programs
- **53%** increase in program attendance
- **3%** increase in staffing levels, a return to pre-pandemic levels
- 16% of libraries started construction of at least one new branch location

Year-End Smart Giving Tips to Reduce Your Tax Burden

Annual fund gifts support programming at the libraries.

Donating stock to a charity at the end of the year is one of the easiest ways to support a cause you care about. A stock gift can help you avoid capital gains taxes, which allows you to have a greater impact. Additionally, the recipient nonprofit doesn't pay taxes on the gift.

For those who are 70 ½ or older. satisfy required minimum distributions (RMD) by making a gift from your IRA. You can reduce your adjusted gross income and possibly receive the full tax benefit if you're not taking the standard deduction.

Packers Foundation Grants \$4,000 for Dream Bus

The Green Bay Packers Foundation recently awarded Madison Public Library Foundation a \$4,000 grant that will power Dream Bus mobile library operations.

The Dream Bus — jointly operated by Madison Public Library and Dane County Library Service, with support from the foundation — currently visits 18 underserved areas around Madison and Sun Prairie each week. Visitors can check out books, movies, and other library collection items; use Wi-Fi; pick up holds and return library materials; and sign up for a library card.

The Packers Foundation grant was one of 398

benefiting Wisconsin charitable groups working in the areas of arts and culture, athletics, and education. A total of \$1.5 million was distributed.

"We're proud to award \$1.5 million through our annual Packers Foundation grants this year," said Packers President/CEO Mark Murphy. "We are incredibly grateful for the work the recipient organizations carry out each and every day. The Packers are honored to recognize and support their dedication to positively impacting their communities."

Imagination Center Gains Support as Groundbreaking Nears

The Imagination Center at Reindahl Park, a new library and community hub designed to serve the city's northeast side, received two major grants recently. The Imagination Center is a collaboration of Madison Public Library, Madison Public Library Foundation, Madison Parks, and City of Madison Engineering.

Madison Community Foundation announced in November that it will give \$250,000 — the largest amount among its recent round of grants totaling \$1.34 million — toward the project.

In October, the Wisconsin Department of Administration committed \$4.25 million to the City of Madison for the Imagination Center through the Flexible Facilities Program (FFP). Funded through the U.S. Department of Treasury Capital Projects Fund as part of

the Biden-Harris Administration's American Rescue Plan Act, FFP grants will fund public facility expansion or improvement projects designed to provide reliable broadband access to local communities, including libraries, community centers, and multipurpose community facilities in order to address critical requirements of digital and broadband access resulting from or exacerbated by the coronavirus pandemic.

"I'm incredibly proud to be working alongside our dedicated state agencies and federal partners to help bolster our public infrastructure, including supporting our libraries and community centers and expanding access to critical services for folks in every corner of our state," Gov. Tony Evers said in a press release announcing the FFP grants, which included 35 projects totaling \$115 million.

Madison Public Library Foundation staff worked on both the Madison Community Foundation and FFP grant applications.

Groundbreaking for the Imagination Center is expected to take place in late spring. Visit madpl.org/reindahl for more information this spring.



I AM A Man Exhibit, Events at Goodman South Madison Library Through February

Visit Goodman South Madison Library through February 28 to view the new exhibition *I AM A Man: The Re-humanization of Black Men,* organized by the Bubbler at Madison Public Library.

This deeply personal reflection on the continued dehumanization of Black men in America is curated by Sharon Bjyrd, a painter and mixed-media artist who took an influential trip to the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. memorial at the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis. The experience heightened her awareness of the stark difference in how Black men face life-altering and sometimes life-ending consequences of racial macro-aggression, and propelled her to use her art to re-humanize them.

The exhibit features work from five additional visual artists and draws from the iconic "I Am A Man" slogan, which emerged during the 1968 Memphis sanitation workers' strike — a protest against the dangerous and degrading conditions Black workers endured.

Join Bjyrd and the exhibiting artists at the library for community conversations, performances from *Da Classroom Ain't Enuf*, and participatory art opportunities on the following dates:

- Saturday, January 18, 1-4 p.m.
- Thursday, February 20, 6-7:30 p.m.

Goodman South Madison Library is located at 2222 S. Park Street. The exhibition is available for viewing during open library hours: 10 a.m.–8 p.m. Monday–Friday, 9 a.m.–5 p.m. Saturday, and 1–5 p.m. Sunday.
